

## Strategies for Ethical Leadership: Reflections on Umar ibn al-Khattab's (RA) Governance



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### ABSTRACT

This article examines the leadership strategies of Umar ibn al-Khattab (RA) the second Caliph of Islam as a model of ethical governance. 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### Introduction

This core theme of equality supplied justice and objectivity in all judicial and administrative issues. All the subjects including the ruler were bound by the law and this was Umar's (RA) unique strategy of government.

- **Accountability of Officials:**

When Amr ibn al-As, the governor of Egypt and his son were accused of wrongdoing by a Christian citizen, Umar (RA) conducted a thorough investigation. He ensured justice by punishing both the governor and his son publicly, setting a precedent that no one regardless of rank was above the law (Ibn Kathir, 1997).

- **Inclusivity in Justice:**

Umar's (RA) policies extended to protecting the rights of marginalized groups, including women, children and the poor. He ensured widows and orphans received financial support from the public treasury and actively addressed their grievances.

- **Self-Awareness of Leadership Responsibility:**

Umar (RA) famously declared, "If a mule stumbles in Iraq, I fear Allah will ask me, 'Why did you not pave the road for it?'" This demonstrates his profound understanding of the accountability a leader carries, extending even to the smallest details of governance (Ibn Sa'd, 2001).

### **Accountability of Public Officials**

Umar (RA) held public officials to the same high standards of accountability. He closely monitored their conduct, wealth and treatment of citizens, ensuring they served with integrity and fairness.

- **Monitoring Wealth Accumulation:**

Umar (RA) kept records of his governors' assets and intervened if they accumulated disproportionate wealth. For example, he dismissed Sa'd ibn Abi Waqqas, one of his governors, after an investigation revealed signs of corruption.
